Mexican black metal isn't something that I would say that I'm too familiar with. Come to think of it, I'm pretty sure that Demonic For-

est has to be one of the first bands that I've heard from Mexico (I might be wrong, but no matter). Have you ever got the feeling that some bands are just trying too hard in order to cling on to the "old spirit" of black metal? Well, in Demonic Forest case I couldn't help but to chuckle at the logo where they managed to include not only three inverted crosses, but also an inverted pentagram and the numbers "666".

Either way, when trying to review I try not to get nitpick too much on anything else but the music, but sometimes you just can't help it I suppose. Luckily for them they manage to produce some pretty alright music, but the first track isn't too good. However, the tracks after the first one are much better as they slow it all down a few notches and concentrate on playing old-school black metal that has a "depressive" vibe to it.

What I find interesting about this release is how the first side called "Desolation" is black metal while the other side of the tape (called "Ruin") is pretty much just instrumental tracks consisting of clean guitar. I'm not sure as to what gave them idea of doing this, but I would have to admit that the "Ruin" side is pretty alright as well.

If you haven't looked up Mexican black metal yet I guess that Demonic Forest could be a good start. Keep in mind though that if you aren't into raw recordings then you might as well look elsewhere.

# Diagon - Satan Mit Uns 9 tracks, 44:48

comes Diagon from the Czech Republic and this is really raw black metal. There is no need to make this

"polished" or melodic... this is pure fast black metal. Almost every song starts with an intro, like it or not. It is a rather nice feature with intros sometimes but it can get to much, sure it builds up a special feeling in the beginning but... On this it is ok, it makes you catch your breath before the total violence starts again and actually it creates a good feeling of destruction and war, which suits Diagon very well. In the booklet it is stated "Diagon supports mass murders and annihilation" and after I have listened to the album I don't doubt it. This is fast, raw and filthy black metal violence from start to end. So if you like blast beats and violence this is something for you. There isn't really much variation on this album but it sure sounds good anyway, if you are in the mood for something that is just bone crushing all the time.
